HER LITTLE BOY.

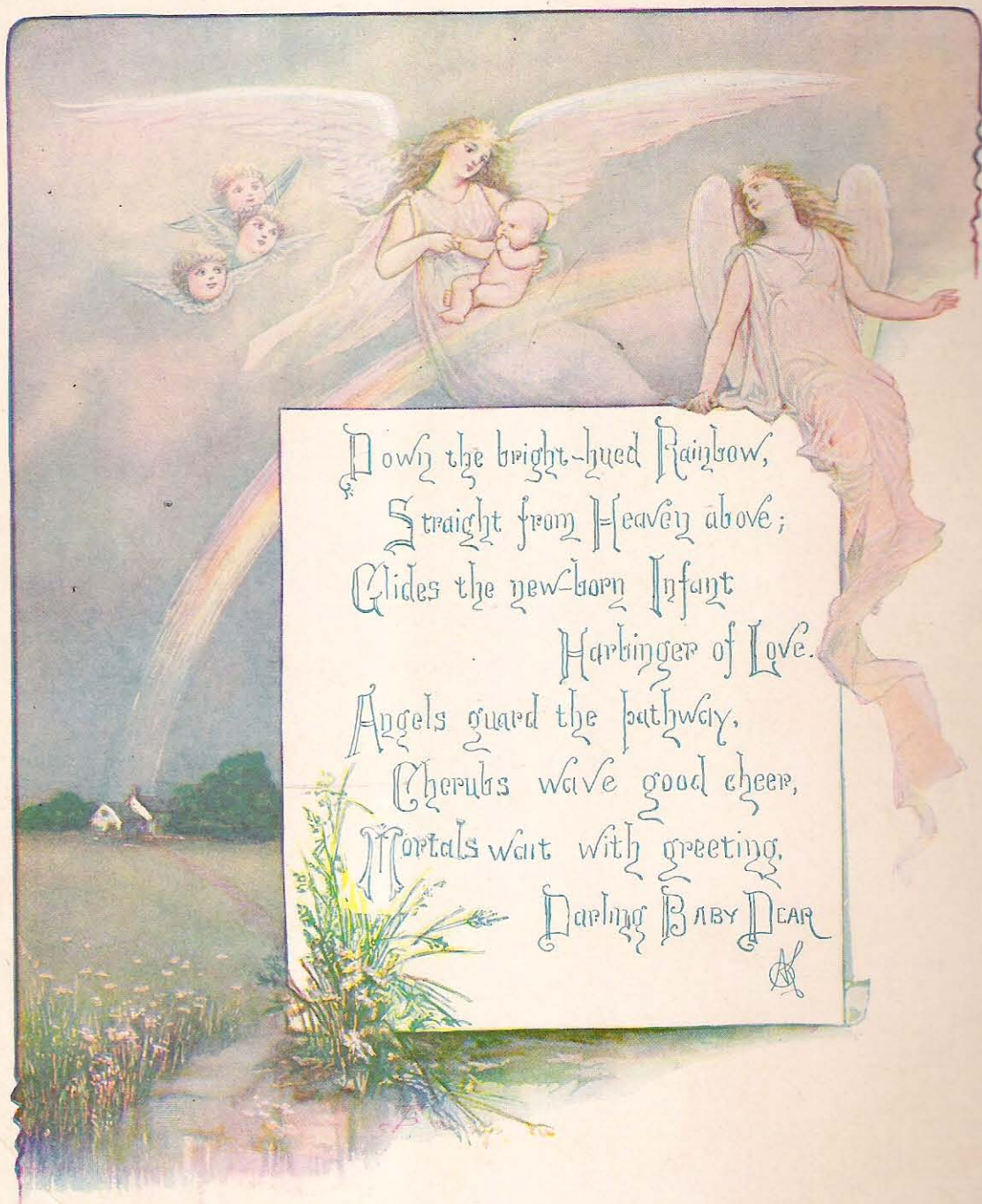
Always a "little boy" to her,
